Q17 How important is it that the Land Trust protect properties that provide public access?

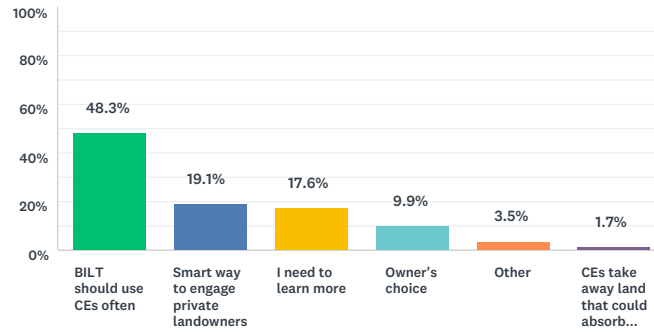

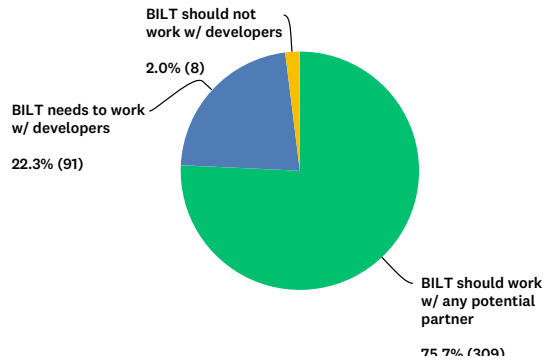

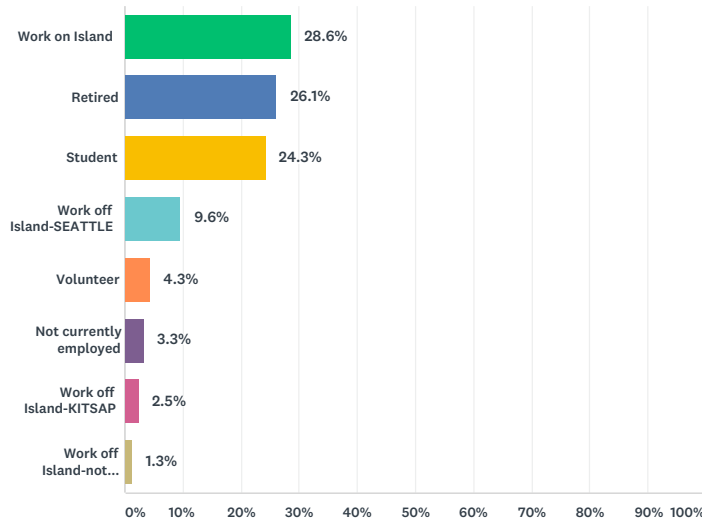

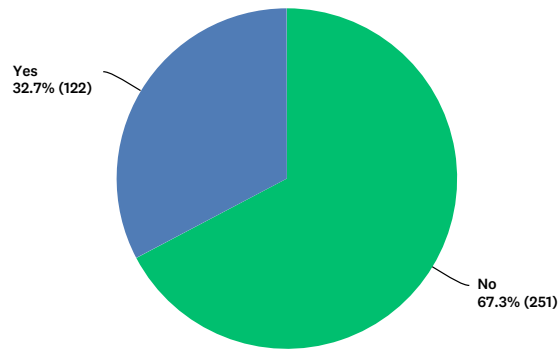
