WESTERN TRILLIUM

Trillium ovatum

Fun Fact: This flower blooms just as robins arrive each spring. Thus its nickname: 'Wake Robin.'

Odocoileus hemionus columbianus

Fun Fact: The most common subspecies of deer in Washington is the Columbian black-tail.

EVERGREEN HUCKLEBERRY

Vaccinium ovatum

Fun Fact: Prized for its culinary and medicinal properties, Evergreen Huckleberry is the last of the native berries to flower each year.

Junco hyemalis

Fun Fact: Dark-eyed juncos frequently build nests on the ground, concealing them under overhanging grass, logs, rocks, or exposed roots.

Fun Fact: Native Americans used a powder made from the inner bark of the tree as a thickener in soups.
